September 5, 2017 Council Report

Good evening Mayor and Council. It's been a long and busy stretch since I last attended a regular council meeting. My apologies for missing the last regular meeting. On August 9th I attended a Strathcona Regional District meeting in Campbell River. Of note was a petition by Quadra Island residents, asking the SRD to research options for a Quadra Island burn bylaw. The petition speaks for itself, and with Jim Abram's permission I'd like to share it with our council, copy provided. Doctor Enns also gave a presentation on local health profiles, alcohol consumption, demographics, and a very interesting topic: "The Social Determinants of Health." The statistics for the North Island are extremely skewed compared to other, more established centers. I left feeling that Tahsis should be proactively engaged in all community health networking forums, as graph determinants are so skewed. I believe the North Island will be an area of much focus. If something can emerge from this report, I hope our council will appoint Kathy Bellanger to this portfolio.

I regret not being able to be in Tahsis the same day for a meeting with our district manager for the Ministry of Forests, Lands and Natural Resource Operations.

On August 24th our Council met with MOTI staff, regarding Head Bay Road improvements. Knowing a plan is developing is encouraging. Something we need to address is the roadside vegetation management plan. Leaving the leaning hazard trees standing until the adjacent area is harvested, just isn't doing anything for us.

On August 26th I took in a few hours of the music festival at West Bay. I can happily attest to what a wonderful amphitheater West Bay really is. I do hope that all the hard work that went into setting this up doesn't go unnoticed. I wish them every success in the future.

Would the council approve a stream enhancement project near the pond across from Pete's Farm?

A Community Petition to Help Prevent Wildfires on Quadra Island
- see attached petition

We, the undersigned residents of Quadra Island petition the Strathcona Regional District to research options for creating a Quadra Island Burn Bylaw, that harmonizes the Fire Prevention Standards for all of Quadra Island. The purpose of this bylaw is to regulate, and enforce all burning activities on public and private land. Currently Quadra Island has two separate mandates for fire prevention strategies. One administered by the South Quadra Improvement District. North Quadra is administered by the Ministry of Forests. One set of standards would make sense. Quadra Island is extremely vulnerable to wildfire, human caused or otherwise. A wildfire anywhere on the island has potential to affect everyone.

Hopefully the 523 signatures collected on this petition will allow the Burn Bylaw initiative to move forward and allow the S.R.D. to research options for our island in developing one uniform set of fire prevention regulations for the entire island by extending the Fire Protection District. Regulations could then be developed in conjunction with community input.

Most signatures were collected on Quadra Island by personal contact. When the Burn Bylaw proposal was first floated, it was thought to be more of a North Quadra issue. It was quite surprising that there was so much interest from the south end of the island, considering that fire protection services exist there already with two fire stations.

While collecting signatures there were many fire stories, and at times, overwhelming expressions of concern and fear of the island burning. Many of those I spoke to did not know of the two jurisdictions, and of the different mandates of each. There were many questions and suggestions of what should be looked at if incorporation of the Bylaw is allowed to proceed. I would like to share some of this input with you now, concerns and recommendation are as follows;

- Fire Hazard Rating should be determined on Quadra Island
- Campfire Bans during the summer with the promotion of portable stoves for cooking
- Beach Fires, please extend the prohibition to North Quadra Island
- Backyard Burning season should finish by the end of March to be less threatening
- Slash Piles, machine built versus hand built, should they be inspected and permitted? Fire equipment with adequate water supply on hand, ready to respond to a fire spread should be mandatory. This is especially critical on North Quadra with no Fire Department to respond.
- Unsupervised vacation rentals should have strict no fire policies
- Spark arrestors should be mandatory for A.T.V.s (Ft. McMurray fire in 2016)
- Exploding targets should be banned (suspected cause of 108 Mile, fire and evacuation)
- Fire Smart training required for guide staff of any organization, or company that uses campfires as part of their adventure package, in providing a wilderness experience for their clientele, to include Kayak Companies Fishing Charters, Wildlife Viewing, Religious Organizations, Boy Scouts of

Canada, to name a few. Fire Safety Education for clients of these organizations, and perhaps through the school would be a valuable community service..

Maximum fines for careless disposal of cigarettes and for disregarding Campfire Bans

Industrial activity in the forest during extended, dry, windy conditions is a huge concern

Last year the Fire Dept. crossed their jurisdictional boundary to fight a fire caused by a branch falling on a hydro line during a severe windstorm. The decision was made due to Coastal Fire being reluctant to attend. The fire was deemed too small when first reported. Within minutes it was spreading quickly in extreme wind. If the Fire Dept. had not attended when they did there may have been no stopping it. In that situation the Fire Dept left one of its two crews on South Quadra in case of a fire start. Since a precedent was set in this case, would it be possible to service the Northern Communities by Fire Truck from S. Quadra as backup to community efforts in fighting fires? Fire equipment and water sources are limited for many people.

- A better working relationship needs to be established with Coastal Fire with regards to wildfire anywhere on the island and from whatever cause. We all stand to lose if a fire takes hold.
- Enforcement, how would this be accomplished?
- What is the cost to taxpayers?
- Zero tolerance for fire regulation infractions, and maximum fines.

There has been some confusion surrounding this petition. Some are of the opinion that unless there is a fire station on North Quadra there are no other options to pursue. Others are concerned about a huge tax burden on the community. I have requested a public information meeting be held for the community on Quadra Island, once more information becomes available on the Burn Bylaw possibility.

The economics of Quadra Island are heavily dependant on the north of the island. Several Woodlots, Timberwest, Aquaculture, Tourist Operators and Main Lake Provincial Park, as well as Walcan Seafoods, the largest employer on the island, are outside the South Quadra Fire Protection District. A serious fire could destroy more than the forest and our homes,

With more people living, working and playing on the island, and with hotter, dryer, windier conditions in the summer, we need to act now. Anything that can be done in an effort to make the island safer from human caused fires should be done. Having the island treated as one unit, the development of localized Fire Prevention Regulations, service options if possible, and a good working relationship with Coastal Fire would make Quadra Island safer from human caused fires.

I will send a photocopy of this submission to the Quadra Fire Department Board of Trustees, to discuss at their next Board Meeting on September 14, 2017.



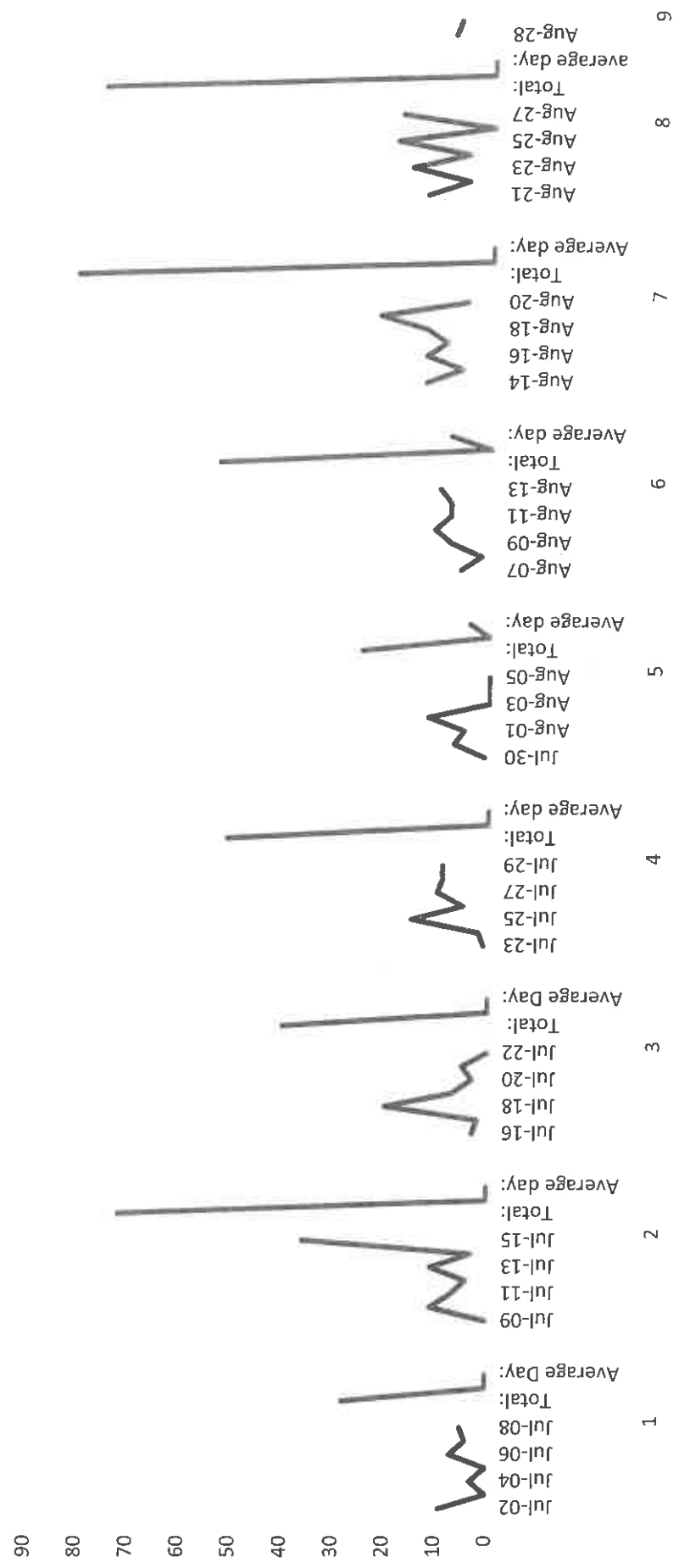

Tahsis Days 2017 Report

First of all, I would like to give a sincere thank you to all the dedicated event volunteers, all the wonderful people who braved the weather to come out and enjoy the weekend, and of course to all the generous individuals/businesses that donated! It takes the whole community to make Tahsis Days a success and it was nice to see that the rain didn't dampen our Village spirit!!!

This year we received a total of \$4785 in cash donations from 17 individuals & businesses both local and non-local, with over half of that being donated by Nootka Sound Timber (thanks Councilor Overton for making that happen!) \$1000 of the donation money went directly to the Raft Race cash prizes and \$275 to the Parade leaving \$3510 to be used for prizes, materials, and any other expenses (donation letter mail outs, etc). There were also 9 other individuals & businesses who donated non-cash items to Tahsis Days. Prizes were supplied to 12 events in total. The large donation from Nootka Sound Timber allowed us to provide free popcorn for those who came to watch the Thursday films & the outdoor movie. Along with free pop or juice for the kids at Movie Night, free drop ins for the pool party, & free bocce ball. We were also able to increase the cash prizes for the children's bike decorating, the Raft Race, & bocce ball, as well as purchase some extra prizes for events we weren't originally planning to do prizes for! Thanks again to Nootka Sound Timber for making all that possible! A list of Tahsis Days event winners is posted at the Rec Centre and on the "Tahsis Days 2017" Facebook page as well as the Village of Tahsis Facebook page.

Most of the events were held by the same dedicated volunteers/organizations as previous years but we were excited to have some new events on the schedule this year as well. The seniors organized a Market square & a bake sale over at the school. Live music was performed behind the Rec Centre by locals of "Nootka Sounds" as well as other community members. Councilor Bellanger organized the Sumo soccer games (blow up sumo suits in case you were wondering! Hilarious to watch!) It was a huge hit with the teens and a few adults. There was also a beer gardens held by Sally's Grill. As well as the short films on Thursday evening produced by local, Troy Moth. They were all great additions to the festivities & we hope to have these events continue (& possibly grow) for years to come!

The overall attendance was noticeably down from last year due to less tourists but there was still a good crowd of people at most events. Food events had the greatest attendance. The weather could have been better on Saturday but everybody toughed it out through the bouts of rain and appeared to still be enjoying all the festivities! A couple of events had to be moved indoors because of the damp circumstances but that did not stop the fun from happening. Fortunately, Sunday brought on brighter & dryer skies which was perfect for the Jell-O eating

contest (wouldn't want to move that one indoors!). The clear skies were also perfect for the slug fest competition.

The silent auction had 28 items donated by 9 local residents & organizations along with 6 out of town businesses. The approximate value of those items was \$1,480. At the last minute we decided to purchase one item worth ~\$72.80, making the total value of all items approximately \$1,552.80. The amount of winning bids received from 13 people was \$761.85. Thank you to all who donated to & supported our silent auction!

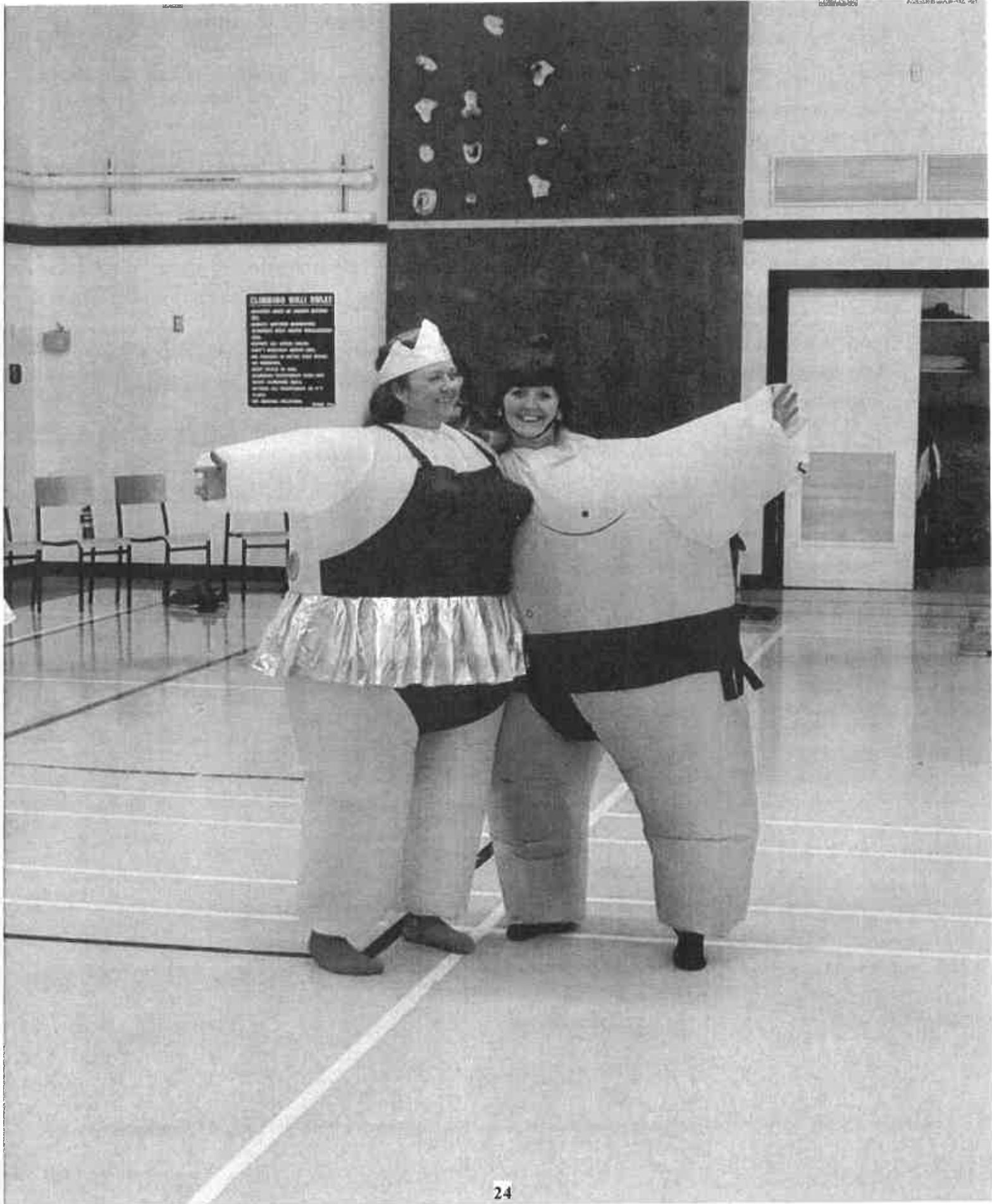



Re: Amalgamation of the Kingcome and Strathcona Timber Supply Areas

On behalf of the Council of the City of Campbell River, I would like to congratulate you on your appointment as Minister of Forests, Lands and Natural Resource Operations.

The Campbell River Forestry Task Force recently had a presentation by Mr. Gary Gwilt of your Ministry, on the impacts of the Great Bear Rainforest Order (GBRO) to the allowable annual cut (AAC). The presentation also included proposed changes to timber supply areas. Timber Supply Areas (TSA) were established to ensure sustainable harvests and sustainable communities.

The City of Campbell River remains very concerned about the economic impact with the decrease in AAC. We recognize that the harvest level, at that point in time, was considerably less than the AAC and, in theory, should not affect forest/logging operations. However, approximate reductions to the AAC of the central coast of 80%, Kingcome of 50% and Strathcona of 10% and the distribution of these decreases, poses considerable economic concern to our constituents.

Contractors, consultants and workers directly employed in forest operations are affected by the GBRO. We are the third largest city on Vancouver Island, and the largest constituent area directly impacted by the changes. We are concerned as to how the reconfiguration and amalgamation of the Kingcome and Strathcona TSAs will affect the sustainability of Campbell River and other North Island communities. Community engagement with the City has been limited since the passing of the GBRO. Therefore, we respectfully request that all affected local governments be engaged in and apprised of any proposed changes to the reconfiguration of TSA boundaries prior to adoption.

Please feel free to contact my office to discuss this important issue.

Thank you for your letter of August 3, 2017, and please extend my thanks to the Council of the City of Campbell River for the message of congratulations on my recent appointment as Minister of Forests, Lands, Natural Resource Operations and Rural Development.

In that same letter you raised concerns regarding the reconfiguration of the Kingcome and Strathcona timber supply areas (TSAs), and impacts of the *Great Bear Rainforest Order* and *Great Bear Rainforest (Forest Management) Act (GBR Act)* on the allowable annual cut (AAC), and possible implications for members of your community.

The *GBR Act* that came into effect on January 1, 2017, is the product of lengthy collaborative negotiations between, the Province of British Columbia, First Nations, the forest industry and environmental groups. Reaching agreement between the parties was challenging and required the province to set a new AAC target for the GBR (2.5 million cubic metres per annum for 10 years/working forest of 550,032 hectares). An important element underlying this annual target was the creation of two new TSAs inside the GBR and a third new TSA on Vancouver Island.

These changes have reduced the AACs in the former North Coast TSA by 39.8 percent, and by 32.2 percent in the former Mid Coast TSA, to make up the new GBR North TSA. AAC reductions in the new GBR South TSA have been achieved by reducing the GBR portions of the former Kingcome TSA (by 15.1 percent) and the former Strathcona TSA (by 5.4 percent). This process considered each management unit's unique forest profile, including species that grow at different rates, relative amounts of old growth and second growth, amount of timber that is economically available for harvesting, and protected areas. Exempt from this process were certain First Nations and small volume tenures.

Forest companies have adjusted their rate of harvesting to reflect the lower AAC in the GBR, and industry has told us that their agreements with environmental groups and partnerships

with First Nations will support a viable forest economy in the region and provide the certainty that forest companies need to continue to operate in the GBR.

The Vancouver Island portions of the former Kingcome and Strathcona TSAs are outside the GBR, and have been reconfigured into the new North Island TSA. The North Island TSA is not affected by the new forest management practices now in place in the GBR, and there are no new rules applied to this TSA that require a reduction in the annual allowable harvest volumes.

The agreements achieved between the province, First Nations and stakeholders are essential to renewing the international social licence for timber harvesting on the BC coast and are expected to support the long-term economic viability of the forest industry for BC coastal communities. Fundamental to these agreements, and on-going implementation discussions, are the objectives of ecological integrity, human well-being and reconciliation with First Nations. The province will be working with all levels of government to monitor the outcomes in these areas.

As we continue our work to implement the *Great Bear Rainforest Land Use Orders* and *GBR Act*, the province is keen to ensure that communication with local government remains open, effective and responsive. I have instructed ministry staff to follow up with your office to respond to any requests that Council may have for more detailed information about the GBR.

In the meantime, should you have any further questions about the province's GBR commitments, please do not hesitate to contact Jeff Sheldrake, Executive Director, Regional Operations – Coast Area, by phone at 250 356-7723 or by email at jeff.sheldrake@gov.bc.ca.

Thank you again for your letter, and I look forward to working with the City of Campbell River as the province works to develop a fair and lasting strategy to create more forest sector jobs in the communities of British Columbia.

GRANT IN AID POLICY

1) INTRODUCTION

The following is the policy developed by the Village of Tahsis to provide fair and equitable disbursement of funds to community groups.

Council may in its annual budget allocate funds for disbursement to non-profit groups to be evaluated on individual merit. The donation may be made in kind or cash.

Individual merit and available funds will dictate Council's decision. Any approval of a grant-in-aid will be made by a vote of at least 2/3 of the Council members present.

2) ADVERTISING

The Village will advertise the Grant in Aid application process and requirements. Any changes to this information will be posted each year.

3) GRANT IN AID APPLICATION PROCESS

It is the policy of the Village of Tahsis that all applicants:

- a) Must submit a signed letter of application, stating the amount of assistance required, how it will be used and who will benefit;
- b) Must also submit a completed grant in aid form;
- c) All requests must be made in writing.

4) GRANT IN AID ADMINISTRATION PROCESS

All applications will be reviewed by staff prior to submission to Council.

- a) Complete letter and application forms are given to the Director of Finance for review. The Director writes a report to Council stating the amount of funds available in the grant in aid account as well as staff recommendations.
- b) The completed grant in aid request with staff report and recommendations will be included on the next regular council meeting agenda following the completion of the report by staff. Should the report not be finished before the agenda deadline date the

application will be put on the next regular meeting agenda. Applicants must allow additional time for their grant in aid processing to allow for inclusion in the agenda.

5) CRITERIA

It is the policy of the Village of Tahsis that awarding of Grants in Aid be based upon:

- a) **Community Benefit**
Grant is Aid must benefit or have the potential to benefit all residents

6) AWARD OF GRANT NOTIFICATION

Applicant will be notified by mail immediately following the council meeting in which the decision is made as to success or failure of the grant in aid application.

7) DISBURSEMENT

Funds will be disbursed to the applicant upon Council's approval of the grant.
