Mayor Davis (written report)

As a follow up to recent social media posts and speculation, I should state that Council has decided to move the fire hall to the old woodshop at the school, following pending upgrades. The school district has agreed to this arrangement and this will become the permanent location. The previous location was found to be in dangerous condition, with cracks in the building that were widening over time. It was also located where it could be seriously compromised in the event of a tsunami. The school location was not our first choice as we would like to have located it in a site with no tsunami or flood risk, but this would have involved purchasing land and rebuilding from scratch, which could have cost \$2 million and taken much longer as the building would have to be designed and constructed. The compromise was to use the school location as it is reasonably safe, is in a good location and would require retrofits as opposed to replacement. Costs are expected to come in under \$1million. Despite having conversations with cabinet ministers, we have found no outside funding to date, apart from a minor grant to help cover initial design work. We realized that it is important to get this done as quickly as possible because currently, our fire department is scattered across two locations, the fire trucks aren't as well protected as they could be and we risk losing more volunteers if we don't have a fire hall to practise in. This could also compromise our ability to fight fires in Tahsis and affect our insurance.

In the last month, Tahsis has seen its largest covid outbreak but to date, there has still been no fatalities and few serious illnesses in our village. At the same time, the omicron variant, which is much more spreadable but milder, is running its course. With luck, this will be the last outbreak and the disease will become much more manageable, leading to a return to normalcy in the near future. Personally, I am looking forward to the climbing wall reopening as it has been closed for longer than we had hoped for.

Regarding the logging float camp that had sunk over Christmas; it has been demolished and the materials from it will be removed from town. The metal will be recycled and the other materials, deemed contaminated, will be transported to the dumpsite in Campbell River, paid for by Western Forest Products.

The Strathcona Regional District is changing its emergency notification system from Connect Rocket to Alertable beginning in May and will apparently need no new action by citizens, if you are already signed up.

My name is Sarah Fowler and I am a village of Tahsis municipal councillor who sits on the Nootka Sound Watershed society regional board since 2018 and have prepared this submission on their behalf with the help of the many involved stakeholders.

The NSWS visions is from the website https://www.nootkasound.info/

We envision a future of abundant salmon returns and prosperous fisheries for the long term benefit of all communities of Nootka Sound and Esperanza Inlet

- Your connection to the topic of watershed security.
- 2. The topic of watershed security connects with our work in many ways, the first of which is sheer volume of water in our rivers, and changes in these levels over the years. Since joining the board I have heard about the effects of logging practice on steam flows, flooding and erosion. I have learned about Large Woody Debris and a plan to re-introduce beavers to assist in re-watering effected landscapes. I have witnessed first nations leadership on both the salmon parks initiative and tidal power experiments. The range in fields of study from silviculture solutions for steelhead to monitoring riparian restoration efforts in a manner that multi year stable funding from the province could further enhance. On a hyper local level I have seen my entire community mobilize to protect the McKelvie watershed from logging plans and its down stream effects, as it is a back up to keeping excellent water quality an open option in addition to our municipal well. The connection of water quality, local economies and food security is part of the Nootka sound lifestyle.
- Your response to the discussion paper for the Watershed Security Strategy and Fund.
 My response to the discussion paper is multi pronged. The first measure is the lakes, rivers and streams as habitat for salmonids. The second accounts for effects, from the age of trees saplings on river levels, to the gravel bar erosions forcing rivers

underground. The third element is the responsibility of local government and regional districts for proving turbidity as an effect of management, or lack there of, on a landscape level. Lastly I hope to focus on the fund part, as a means to celebrate winning strategies, in balancing for biodiverse values, carbon sequestration and as a future archival base line in the study for climate resilient and resistance to food insecurity, fires and flooding.

\$904,000 Riparian and Habitat Restoration Project Nears Completion in Nootka Sound

FYI

The Nootka Sound Watershed Society (NSWS) is pleased to announce that its 3-year riparian restoration project is nearing completion. After being awarded a project worth \$904,010 from the Fisheries and Oceans Canada Coastal Restoration Fund, the NSWS has coordinated the planning, implementation and monitoring of silviculture treatments on the Sucwoa, Tahsis and Leiner-Perry Rivers near Tahsis, the Little Zeballos River near Zeballos and Chum Creek near Oclucje. These watersheds are all located within traditional Nuu-chah-nulth territories, including Mowachaht/Muchalaht First Nation, Nuchatlaht First Nation, and Ehattesaht First Nation traditional territories. The purpose of this project is to contribute to the restoration of salmon populations by creating habitat and environmental features that are critical to salmon. This was done using a variety of forestry practices to improve bank stability and salmon habitat.

The NSWS hired Strategic Natural Resource Consultants to oversee the project with direction from our governing board and Western Forest Products. Two silviculture contractors were involved in the project including Nootka Reforestation Ltd and Adanac who hired local forestry crews from Tahsis, Gold River, Tsaxana, Zeballos and Campbell River. Crews were able to hone their skills in safe and effective riparian restoration techniques.

Over 135 hectares of riparian area received silviculture treatments. These treatments were aimed at accelerating natural forest processes by planting and promoting coniferous tree species (western red cedar and Sitka spruce) which create a long term root network which helps to stabilize stream banks and provide future large woody debris input into streams. They also help to

create old growth attributes that support diverse ecosystems that contribute to healthy forests and streams. In all, over 21,000 trees were planted throughout the 3-years of the project.

Historically, forestry practices did not regulate the harvesting of streamside vegetation; however, current day forestry legislation requires riparian zones on all fish bearing streams to be protected and left in their natural state. These protection measures help to maintain and support critical habitat that supports populations of Pacific Salmon, steelhead and trout. Managing forests stands along streams in this manner will ensure the long-term contribution of large wood to streams, reduce sediment released into streams and contribute needed organic components and insects to the river adding building blocks of stream food webs.

We are grateful to have the support of the Mowachaht/Muchalaht, Ehattesaht and Nuchatlaht Nations and acknowledge their continued stewardship of lands within Nootka Sound.

J. Council Reports

Mayor Davis (written report)

On January 26, we had the 2022 inaugural meeting of the First Nations Relations Committee at the Strathcona Regional District. I was nominated to become chairman of the 2022 sessions. Since April of 2021, the Ka:'yu:'k't'h'/Che:k:tles7et'h' First Nations have joined the regional district as a full member, represented by Kevin Jules. As our only First Nation representative on the regional board and this committee, I in turn nominated Kevin as it seemed appropriate for him to have this opportunity. He accepted and was elected Chair. Congrats! I was elected Vice-Chair.

The road to Tahsis has been in a seriously poor condition lately, resulting in one of our residents breaking a spring. Following his post on social media and numerous citizen complaints, I initiated a group pothole-fixing session yesterday, which was attended by about a dozen people. We showed up with shovels and buckets and set about filling some of the more jarring holes by the Leiner bridge and further up the road. It was a fun exercise and social event of sorts. We took pictures and videos and sent them to CHEK News and CTV, which promptly put out stories today. I was also interviewed by both and these will be on tonight's news. I received an apologetic call from Mainroad, the maintenance contractor for the road, who explained that their grader is once again broken. They have recently subcontracted maintenance to Cypress Lake Logging, whom had offered last fall to provide some backstop maintenance on the road.

I will once again reiterate, and told the media the same, that the system is fundamentally broken and needs reform. Back when the Forest Service was responsible for maintenance, we had two graders working in all weather. Now we have one working occasionally, leading to unsafe driving conditions and unnecessary damage to our vehicles. On top of it, logging trucks leaving the Leiner Mainline are again using large offroad trucks, which Western Forest Products had promised to phase out in favour of less-damaging highway trucks. In my opinion, the provincial government needs to reassert control of maintenance of our road and to move away from the for-profit contract model that leads to higher costs and lower maintenance. Tomorrow, I will be meeting with our MLA to discuss these issues.

The Society of Saint Vincent de Paul was founded in Paris in 1833 by Frederic Ozanam and stablished in Canada in November 1846. The Society of Saint Vincent de Paul of Vancouver Island has been supporting people in need on Vancouver Island since 1916 and was incorporated in 1953. Focused on impacting the lives of people affected by poverty, the Society offers emergency relief services while maintaining a focus and commitment to addressing the root causes that contribute to poverty in our communities.

On the north island, the Society provides person to person emergency outreach in Port Alberni, Nanaimo, Courtenay, Campbell River, Tahsis and Gold River through a home visit program provided by conferences of member volunteers.

Two of the most recent outreach projects include:

- The Saint Vincent de Paul Tahsis Community Cupboard. This has allowed storage and food distribution each month for an average of 97 individuals in 44 households and 24 pets. In 2020 nearly 19,000 pounds of donated items were shipped to Tahsis, along with the monthly shipments from SSVP purchased non-perishable basic food staples.
- The SSVP Gold River Food Security Program assisted 118 people in Gold River and in the first nations community of Tsaxana an additional 18 singles, 15 couples, 15 families of 3 4 people and 30 households of 5 -8 people were helped. In addition, 30 pets received pet food each month.

On southern Vancouver Island the Society currently provides 128 units of supportive and affordable housing serving women and children, seniors and people facing homelessness. In addition, the Society operates a food pantry, home visit program, education, training, and emergency relief program. Through the Ozanam Centre, the Society operates a community integration program for persons with developmental disabilities, helping people achieve a higher quality of life. Believing in sustainable development, the Society operates two thrift stores that contribute to both financial sustainability and the provision of clothing and household items to those in need. The programs offered by the Society are supported by more than 150 volunteers and 75 staff.

The province of BC recently announced that as they move forward with implementing BC's new accessibility legislation, they will be prescribing organizations (such as municipalities) to maintain accessibility committees and accessibility plans. This will start in 2022 with a prioritized process.

I am writing to suggest that the Village of Tahsis creates a new Access & Inclusion Committee with a mandate to promote social equity within existing and proposed Village plans, policies, bylaws and infrastructure and make recommendations to ensure that they are inclusive and accommodating to citizens of all ages, abilities, cultures and socioeconomic backgrounds.

As an example, both Nanaimo & Cumberland have accessibility committees with expanded mandates that include social equity.

Canada's population grew at almost twice the pace of every other G7 country from 2016 to 2021, bringing our population to a total of 36,991,981 people. Canada's population growth was however slowed down with the onset of the pandemic. Municipalities benefit from community-level census data when making important urban and rural planning decisions.
