A member of the public had concerns regarding the Mowachaht/Muchalaht First Nation Salmon Parks Declaration to which the Mayor and Staff responded.

What I've done is I've typed out a letter to me and council. Basically, I can go into a lot of details.

Virtually would be criticizing the Mayor's conduct since I've been elected, especially as comments on January 3rd when he deceived the taxpayers of Tahsis announcing that the existing fire hall was unrepairable.

And there are other aspects of the Mayor's conduct that I was very disappointed with as far as his verbal confrontation with me in a local store.

Uh fact that I had to go to the police.

To it, the fact that we are now proceeding with a first responder facilities on school property. I believe that this is not only in colossal active stupidity, but I do believe that this Council and the School Board should bear the responsibility when the first child is injured by such a decision. I can go into Councillor Fowler's conduct.

How basically the conflict of interest which she brought forth the motion to have the Village finance her food box projects.

This not only be in a conflict of interest, but also could be perceived as an act of buying votes in the community.

I was also going to mention her behavior.

Basically, when I did remove the gavel from her, which was completely unprofessional and uh, becoming. As far as Councillor Northcott, her comment comments on February 28th at a closed meeting instructing the administration to come up with ways to screw me over.

I find her not only undemocratic, but outright unethical.

The Council should not seek the indemnity against an officer and an employee or a member of Council and respect of any action of the officer, employee or member that results in the claim for damages against the municipality. Something that your lawyer pointed out to you.

But the Council may see claims arise that claims arise out of gross negligence and mine exposing your conduct in my mail outs is not gross negligence.

I have an officer or employee or member or where in relation to the action that gave rise to the claim against at officer or an employee, the officer or an employee willfully acted contrary to the terms of their employment.

Or an order of a superior, which means you, Mr. Mayor, are responsible for the conduct of this Council and administration.

You are the ones that is liable for these passed violations for the Community Charter.

J. Council Reports

Mayor Davis (written report)

There is some good news with the ambulance service as they are getting more money for staffing, which means that we they will be moving from the station being open for 8 hours per day to 16 hours. The one catch is that while they were fully staffed, they need to hire one person to meet the new staffing requirements. If you are interested or know anybody that would be, have them get in touch with the ambulance service or the Village for information.

I am happy to see that the Mowachaht-Muchalaht First Nation have received endorsement of their Salmon Park concept by the federal government within their traditional territory, with a grant of \$15.2 million toward making this a reality. The money will be used for research, education, restoration and protection of critical habitat.

We can finally announce that we have purchased a small parcel of land adjacent to the Tahsis River, between the north sewage treatment plant and the bridge. This will allow us access for new a new sewage conduit that will allow us to shut down the aging north plant and send all effluent to the south plant, which is funded largely by a grant. Other possibilities for the land include building up a roadway/dike from North Maquinna to the Head Bay Road, which could also become our new sanidump site. Other possibilities could include a dog park, something that many residents have been asking for.

Councillor Joseph (verbal report)

I just want to remind people budget meetings are happening and it would, it would be really nice to see more community members in attendance aside from our one and only very committed community member.

Councillor Fowler (written report)

As you may have noticed from the posters around town, there are only 5 sleeps until the annual CMESS PAC Holiday Bazaar. Many folks local to Tahsis will be showcasing their talent and I want to take a minute to thank the Village for continuing with the long standing tradition of donating the rental of the rec centre tables to the well attended community event. I also want to express a huge debt of gratitude to the parents of Captain Meares students for hosting the community fair, it really does take a team to make the dream work. Lastly, I want to commend the Tahsis Building Supply for donating the photocopying of the Knights of Columbus Christmas Hamper forms and acting as a hub, many years running. If you haven't submitted your form yet please get it in as soon as possible since this year's hampers are expected to go very quickly and on a first come first serve basis. I expect to have some at the bazaar to complete and will be trying to reach the number of 60, which we received last year. I will be submitting them to Kevin before November 30 so if you have one at home partially complete please drop it off at the hardware store or bring it to the bazaar.

Dear Mayor Martin Davis:

I am writing to thank you and your staff for taking the time to meet with me at this year's Union of British Columbia Municipalities (UBCM) Convention in Vancouver, and to recap the topics we discussed and commitments made at our meeting.

During our meeting, we discussed open-net pen fish farms and a proposal for a *Cave Protections Act*. Regarding open-net pen fish farms, the Village of Tahsis expressed support for the move to closed containment of these operations, and communicated that you would be happy to have such facilities based in Tahsis. You were also supportive of expanding to other forms of aquaculture and noted that the region has potential for growth in this area. I agree that the blue economy is incredibly important and that enduring, sustainable jobs are vital to healthy communities. We recommend reaching out to the British Columbia (B.C.) Shellfish Growers Association or Pacific Seaweed Industry Association to see if any members have an interest in expansion of shellfish aquaculture operations to Tahsis.

The Department of Fisheries and Oceans Canada (DFO) is continuing with an engagement process related to the federal 2025 Net-Pen Transition Plan. The provincial government is waiting to see the results of this engagement and has been advocating that DFO consider environmental, social, and economic impacts prior to release of the plan. In addition, following extensive engagement, the Province will be releasing a co-developed Coastal Marine Strategy in 2024 which will guide policies and actions surrounding B.C. waters for the next two decades.

The Village of Tahsis raised concerns regarding the destruction of caves, cultural sites, and groundwater issues associated with damages which can directly impact fisheries. You advocated for legislation because you feel much is falling through the cracks without it. While there is currently not a *Caves Act* being contemplated, we will take your suggestion under consideration, as the *Forest Act* is currently under review; David Muter, Assistant Deputy Minister, has agreed to forward the draft protocols for the Karst Cumulative Effects and its management.

Since meeting in September, the Ministry of Water, Land and Resource Stewardship has become responsible for additional water, land, fish and wildlife authorities. The attached outlines those changes in detail. Engagement sessions will be held with local governments, First Nations and stakeholders in the coming months to review these changes and to continue our work together in these priority areas.

Thank you for your time. I am pleased we had the opportunity to meet about topics important to both provincial and local government.

Thank you to your delegation for meeting with me and Ministry of Forests representatives at the annual UBCM Convention held September 18-22 in Vancouver. I am writing to recap the conversations and commitments made at our meeting, which I hope you found as productive and beneficial as we did.

During the meeting, we discussed Tahsis' wishes for a Community Forest in partnership with local First Nations. The Timber Supply Review is currently underway and is expected to be completed early in the new year. Apportionment will follow, and we will be sure to keep you informed of any decisions. Lesley Fettes, District Manager of the Campbell River Natural Resource District, is available to meet with you to discuss community forest opportunities.

We also discussed old growth protection in the Tahsis area. On October 26, 2023, the Province confirmed the locations of five new Forest Landscape Planning projects including a project in west-central Vancouver Island that includes areas around Tahsis. Staff will be reaching out to municipalities as part of those processes.

Again, I appreciate you taking the time to meet. I am pleased our governments had the opportunity to connect about these important topics.

Dear Mayor Davis:

I am writing to follow-up on our meeting at this year's Union of BC Municipalities Convention on September 20th, 2023. Thank you for the opportunity to hear first-hand from your delegation about the importance of tsunami risk reduction to you and your community, and the work being done to explore the installation of a tsunami warning system.

I understand you are still exploring different options for the Tsunami Alerting System. Amanda Broad, Manager of Disaster Mitigation and Adaptation Policy, Ministry of Emergency Management and Climate Readiness (EMCR) will be in contact to connect you with the Ministry of Citizen Services to discuss whether the Connected Coast Partnership may be an option. With funding, additional components can be added to the network by communities. Recently, Natural Resources Canada provided funding to have earthquake early warning sensors installed at some of the landing sites as part of the Canadian Earthquake Early Warning network.

Funding for monitoring equipment for data collection is an eligible activity in the Disaster Risk Reduction – Climate Adaptation (DRR-CA) stream of the Community Emergency Preparedness Fund (CEPF). The CEPF DRR-CA funding stream can contribute 100% of the cost of eligible activities. A tsunami warning system project is eligible for a maximum of \$150,000 per applicant. Funding requests from two or more eligible applicants for regional projects may be submitted as a single application for eligible, collaborative projects, in which case the maximum funding available would be based on the number of eligible partners included in the application. The next application deadline is March 28th, 2024, and funding permitting, October 4th, 2024, and March 28th, 2025.

I am writing to follow up on Parliamentary Secretary Singh's meeting with representatives from the Village of Tahsis at the 2023 Union of British Columbia Municipalities (UBCM) Convention. I regret that I missed the opportunity to engage with local governments while I was in New York for Climate Week. The opportunities to engage with counterparts from other jurisdictions in North America and elsewhere in the world provide significant opportunities to align our climate actions as well as explore emerging clean energy and technology economic opportunities that benefit the province and communities throughout B.C. As I know you appreciate, the causes of climate change and actions required to address it are many and complex. Efforts to reduce global greenhouse gas emissions require collective action that is best approached at multiple levels, and I know this issue underpins many of the topics raised at UBCM this year.

As you know, the annual UBCM Convention offers an important opportunity for local governments to have conversations and outline priorities with the provincial government. These meetings help to inform ministries on issues that matter most to British Columbians, and I value these opportunities. I hope you continue to engage with my ministry and our government on issues that matter to you and your community so we can continue to move forward with our goals of building a strong, sustainable, innovative economy, a cleaner environment and healthy communities that work for everyone.

In the meeting, I understand you spoke about potential contamination at the former mill site of Western Forest Products Inc. Assistant Deputy Minister Laurel Nash committed to having her office arrange a meeting between the Village of Tahsis and the land remediation team to discuss plans to move forward, including the potential for subdividing the site. Assistant Deputy Minister Nash would also be interested in having conversations with provincial and municipal governments and the proponent. I am pleased this work is underway.

Thank you again for taking the time to meet with Parliamentary Secretary Singh. I look forw	ard to continuing to

Thank you for sending a delegation to meet with me during this year's Union of BC Municipalities (UBCM) Convention. It was a pleasure to hear from you in my first UBCM Convention experience as Minister of Municipal Affairs.

I was very interested in the issues your delegation brought forward including resources for local government elections and mandatory training for elected officials.

With regards to legal resource supports for local governments in situations related to local elections, I will follow up with the Ministry of Attorney General and ensure that staff pass along any information. In addition, UBCM has a fund available to assist with legal costs if the issue has local government system wide implications, and there may be an opportunity for the Village of Tahsis to reach out to UBCM to explore this option. Staff at the Ministry of Municipal Affairs are always available to provide guidance related to the legislative framework for elections and by-elections.

I would also encourage you to make use of other resources designed for local governments in British Columbia. The Local Government Management Association (LGMA) offers a variety of resources to support local elections, including a detailed elections manual, online training, a peer network, and an orientation kit.

The ministry recognizes that how elected officials conduct themselves in their relationships with elected colleagues, staff, and the public is directly connected to how a community is governed. Education and training for newly elected officials is one tool that can be used to proactively address conduct. The Local Government Leadership Academy offers a range of opportunities, including courses specifically for newly elected officials which are offered across the province after each general local election. In addition, the ministry, UBCM and LGMA recently collaborated to develop a new online module called "Responsible Conduct Every Day".

We recognize the need for local governments to maintain public confidence and trust. Hi Mark:

Thanks for sharing the letter from Minister Kang, as it does not appear we were copied on the response.

UBCM only has one legal assistance fund, and that was the one I referenced in our previous email exchange. Our Fund is specific to funding cases that are at the appeal stage. I note the reference in the Minister's letter to 'local government system wide implications' which is not exactly the wording as you can see below, but the idea is that the case (which must be at the appeal stage) has the ability to "affect all local governments or their employees in a substantial way". Please see yellow highlight below related to our Policies:

2.6 financial assistance for legal appeals

UBCM may financially assist a member in a legal appeal subject to the following [Resolution 2(a), 1978].

- (a) There shall be no participation by the UBCM at the initial trial stage in any court action, regardless of whether it is conducted in the Provincial Court of BC, the Supreme Court of BC, or the Federal Court.
- (b) The UBCM shall only participate in appeals of court decisions, prior to consideration by the Court of Appeal of BC, the Federal Court of Appeal, or the Supreme Court of Canada, that affect all local governments or their employees in a substantial way.
- (c) Complete discretion shall be exercised by the UBCM as to whether it should contribute part of the costs of an appeal. The decision as to whether the UBCM will participate shall be made

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by the Executive. If approved by the Executive, UBCM shall contribute 1/3 of the costs to a maximum of \$10,000. (Feb/03, April/ 15)

- (d) There shall be no UBCM participation in court appeals involving the validity of a particular bylaw or the interpretation thereof, which could be achieved by amending the bylaw to bring it within the *Local Government Act*, *Community Charter*, or *Vancouver Charter*.
- (e) The UBCM shall not participate in court appeals that deal with the policy of a particular local government (e.g. shopping hours, no-growth policy, etc.) which may not be a general policy of most local governments.
- (f) The UBCM shall not participate in court appeals when the subject matter is clearly indefensible from its start.

Apologies for the confusion this has caused for you and your community. We will be following up with Ministry staff to ensure that they understand the criteria of our Legal Assistance Fund so this does not happen in the future.
